CalWORKs Child Care

- Supportive service of the CalWORKs program
- In FY 2023-24, 138,751 children received CalWORKs Child Care in California
- Operated in all 58 counties



CalWORKs Child Care Access

"...just knowing I have that in place, a system in place where you know I can work a full-time job. I can go to school. You know...my family pay may fluctuate depending on income, but just knowing that I have that, and I don't have to pay full price for child care."

"I don't think that I could be doing school and working if I didn't have this assistance to help pay for child care."

"I'm grateful that there [are] quite a few providers to choose from. I'm also grateful that some of the nicer centers accept the vouchers."



Project History

- The Master Plan for Early Learning and Care (MPELC) recommends consolidating the California Work Opportunities and Responsibility to Kids (CalWORKs) Child Care stages.
- Consolidation of the CalWORKs Child Care Stages was one objective in the transition of child care programs to the California Department of Social Services (CDSS).

CalWORKs Child Care Stages

Stage One

- Administered by County Welfare Departments
- In Fiscal Year (FY)
 23-24,
 52,332
 children
 served.

Stage 2

- Administered by Alternative Payment Programs (APPs)
- In FY 23-24,
 36,242
 children
 served.

Stage 3

- Administered by APPs.
- In FY 23-24,
 50,177
 children
 served.


Examples of County Definitions of Stability

- Alameda- When the previously aided adult is no longer receiving CalWORKs cash assistance for at least 6 months.
- Butte-Meeting Welfare-to-Work program participation requirements in a work or training related program and making satisfactory progress for three consecutive months
- Calaveras- Three months with the same employer

Project Timeline

Phase One August 2024 – September 2025

 Analyze federal funding parameters, data systems, conduct Parent and Child Care Provider Focus Groups and develop administrator workgroup guide and materials



Phase Two Fall 2025

 Local administrator workgroup



Phase Three Spring 2026

Publish report

Family and Child Care Provider Focus Groups

- Conducted by WestED in May and June
- Advertisements sent through the Child Care Development Division listserv and shared by APPs and Counties
- 40 participants in 12 family focus groups
- 31 participants in eight child care provider focus groups





Family Focus Group Themes

• Family experiences differed based on the organization that issued the CalWORKs Child Care.

 Families who felt that they could easily connect with their child care coordinator had the most positive programmatic experiences.



Programmatic Challenges

- Information gaps concerning child care options
- Challenges making programmatic changes
- Challenges submitting paperwork
- Unclear understanding of the CalWORKs Child Care stages
- Unclear notices



Child Care Provider Focus Group Themes

 Child care provider experiences varied based on the organization that issued their CalWORKs Child Care subsidy payment

• Focus group members were committed to providing care to CalWORKs Child Care families, but were frustrated by operational barriers in the program.



Payment Issues

- Late or missing payments
- Delayed payments when families move to different agencies
- Outdated payment systems

"New providers don't know they have to chase the county every month. I learned that the hard way."



Unclear Communication

- Providers reported finding out about program changes from families
- Lack of clear communication around CalWORKs Child Care stages

"Nobody explains the difference between Stage One, Two, or Three. You have to figure it out on your own."

Child Care Provider Recommendations for Improvement

- System modernization
- Clear onboarding Professional recognition as partners rather than administrative burdens
- Payment transparency
- Improved communication



Family Recommendations for Improvement

- Improved communication
- Individualized support from child care coordinators
- Process improvements
- Resource sharing
- Staff training
