Ryan Banks CEO Turning Point of Central California, Inc.

Ryan Banks has served in managerial and leadership positions at Turning Point of Central California for over 20 years. Turning Point has operated various social service

programs in California since 1970. Mr. Banks is the Chief Executive Officer overseeing almost 50 programs, serving 12,000 people annually. He has many years of experience working in direct service and management roles serving adult homeless, mental health, substance use disorder, and justice-involved populations.

Mr. Banks has received extensive training in mental health crisis assessment and response, including Mental Health First Aid, the Columbia Suicide Severity Rating Scale (C-SSRS), Recognizing and Responding to Suicide Risk (RRSR-MH), and was a certified trainer for Wellness Recovery Action Planning (WRAP) and Professional Assault Crisis Training (Pro-ACT). Mr. Banks has professional experience responding to mental health crises, including working directly with first responders, law enforcement, crisis response teams, and psychiatric hospitals and health facilities. He has participated in critical Sequential Intercept Mapping (SIM) projects with county and community partners to identify gaps and solutions to enhance preventative and post-crisis interventions.

Rebecca Bauer-Kahan Assembly Member (AD-16)/Author of AB 988 California State Assembly

Assemblymember Rebecca Bauer-Kahan was first elected to represent Assembly District 16 in the California State Assembly in 2018, which includes

Alamo, Danville, Dublin, Lafayette, Livermore, Moraga, Orinda, Pleasanton, San Ramon, and Walnut Creek.

Rebecca is an accomplished attorney, environmental advocate, community volunteer, law professor, and mother. A Bay Area native, she is the granddaughter of refugees who came to the United States to escape the Holocaust. Their experiences inspired her to use her career and personal time to help others in her community, solve complex problems, protect civil rights, and fight to ensure everyone has the opportunity to succeed.

As an attorney, Rebecca specialized in ensuring major corporations complied with environmental laws and regulations by leading internal investigations to improve their environmental practices, while maintaining profitability. She also worked with major tech companies on intellectual property cases involving such topics as copyright, trademark, and trade secret theft.

Rebecca oversaw and grew her office's pro bono program, and, under her leadership, the office expanded its efforts to include civil rights, immigration, homelessness, and domestic violence. She has also served on several boards and committees, helping attorneys throughout the Bay Area provide their services to those who desperately need them.

During her time in the Assembly, Rebecca has introduced and advocated for legislation that addresses some of the most pressing needs of our communities and her constituents. Her background as a technology attorney and her dedication to safeguarding reproductive rights are highlighted in her work as chair of the Privacy and Consumer Protection and as founder and chair of the Select Committee on Reproductive Health, respectively. She has championed multiple bills to make California a safe place to live and a bastion for equal rights including protections from AI and the 988 Suicide and Crisis lifeline.

Rebecca is a product of Bay Area public schools and a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania and Georgetown University Law Center. Before serving in the Assembly, she taught appellate law and legal research and writing at Santa Clara University and Golden Gate University and often volunteered at her children's schools. use disorder non-profit agencies that collectively serve over 750 thousand Californians annually. Chad has more than twenty-five years of service in the non-profit sector of California's Public Behavioral Health

System. In addition to many years of working in legislative and administrative advocacy, Chad has experience ranging from direct practice, team supervision and program development, to curriculum design, training, and teaching. Chad became CASRA's Executive Director in August of 2021.

Chad began working directly for CASRA in January 2021 as its Public Policy Director, after almost 20 years of work for Mental Health America of Los Angeles, first as a director of a care coordination team at its renowned Village ISA in Long Beach. This was followed with positions as the organization's Public Policy Director and most recently as the Vice President of Policy. Prior to MHALA, Chad served as the Director of Programs for MHA Orange County overseeing a range of programs serving individuals experiencing homelessness, including MHAOC's AB 2034 program, which focused on adults who were unhoused and experienced behavioral health issues.

CASRA is a statewide provider association whose non-profit members contract for a range of behavioral health services with 25 counties in California. The Association focuses its efforts on shaping and supporting polices that promote recovery and create alternatives to locked/involuntary care. CASRA's member organizations pioneered the development of crisis residential treatment in California and currently provide this level of care in 11 counties. In addition, CASRA member organizations provide peer respite, urgent care, crisis stabilization, and mobile crisis outreach services and a range of residential and outpatient services. Several CASRA member agencies are also part of the 988 suicide and crisis lifeline network. CASRA is a member of the Crisis Residential Association. Chad has extensive experience in both in-person and virtual training and has presented at the local, state and national levels on topics including advocacy skills, crisis intervention, and practice in psychiatric rehabilitation (PSR). He has held a Certified Psychiatric Rehabilitation Practitioner (CPRP) certification since 2001 and is a certified MORS trainer and Mental Health First Aid Instructor. He has taught at the A.A., B.A. and graduate levels for many years, and currently instructs in PSR in the Cerritos College Mental Health Worker Program, and in policy practice, community development, and leadership in the School of Social Work at California State University, Long Beach.

Susan DeMarois was appointed by Governor Gavin Newsom to serve as Director of the California Department of Aging effective November 1, 2021. As Director, Ms. DeMarois is committed to stakeholder

engagement; equity and inclusion; and system transformation to prepare our state for the year 2030 when one in four Californians will be aged 60 or older.

Prior to joining CDA, Director DeMarois led public policy and advocacy for the national Alzheimer's Association in California, serving as the nonprofit organization's registered lobbyist in Sacramento where she advocated for legislative, budget, and regulatory changes at the state capitol. The organization led the effort to enact the first dementia early detection initiative in the nation focused on the Medicaid population: SB 48 (Limón) signed into law by Governor Newsom.

Ms. DeMarois served as an appointee to Governor Newsom's Alzheimer's Prevention and Preparedness Task Force, chaired by former First Lady Maria Shriver, in addition to the Master Plan for Aging Stakeholder Advisory Committee, a workgroup established by Executive Order. In addition, she represented the Alzheimer's Association on the CalHHS Agency Secretary's Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders Advisory Committee.

Before working for the Alzheimer's Association, Ms. DeMarois led government and community relations for the UC Davis Health System where she gained deep health policy and clinical workforce experience. Early in her career, she worked for LeadingAge California, the professional trade association representing not-for-profit housing, residential care, and skilled nursing providers.

Brenda Grealish is currently the Executive Officer on Criminal Justice and Behavioral Health (CCJBH), which is part of the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (CDCR). In this role, Ms. Grealish supports

12 esteemed Councilmembers and leads a team of passionate individuals in an effort to end the criminalization of individuals with behavioral health needs by supporting proven strategies that promote early intervention, access to effective treatments, a planned re-entry and the preservation of public safety. She brings to this role her public policy and administration experience from the California Department of Health Care Services (DHCS), where she offered her expertise in several positions including Chief of the former Mental Health Services Division, Assistant Deputy and Acting Deputy Director for Mental Health and Substance Use Disorder Services, and Chief of the Medi-Cal Behavioral Health Division. She also served in several research positions in CDCR's Office of Research, including Deputy Director and Research Manager II & III levels. The intersection of Ms. Grealish's experience between CDCR and DHCS, in particular, makes her a dynamic Executive Officer for CCJBH, and her high energy, ability to effectively make connections between multiple public systems and extensive knowledge of state service, along with her high regard for and reliance on the expertise of individuals with lived experience, help to shape and improve public systems for individuals with behavioral health needs who are, or at risk of becoming, justice system involved.



Taun Hall Executive Director The Miles Hall Foundation

The day Taun Hall's son Miles was shot and killed, she stepped into her life's work: Creating change to protect families from a system that failed her son.

Since June 2, 2019, Taun has worked tirelessly with

her husband Scott and daughter Alexis, to not only promote awareness of the problems embedded in the care for those living with mental illness, but to identify where the levers of change are. Since Miles's death, The Miles Hall Foundation was created. The mission is:

To support and protect families by educating communities about mental illness and by protecting those suffering with mental illness from excessive use of force by law enforcement.

Her work is supported by the FRIENDS OF SCOTT, ALEXIS AND TAUN HALL, and JUSTICE FOR MILES HALL, which have volunteers and supporters from all over the country. She is an advocate and Co-Sponsor for The Miles Hall Lifeline and Suicide Prevention Act - AB 988 which was signed into California legislation on September 2022. This legislation provides an alternative number to 911 that involves trained mental health professionals, and a mobile crisis response team that doesn't involve the police.

She is an advocate of The Miles Hall Crisis Hub, which is 24/7 as of December 1, 2023 and provides mental health services in Contra Costa County, and is staffed with licensed behavioral health clinicians and peers with lived experience who will triage calls, de-escalate situations, and dispatch mobile crisis teams.

Taun formed alliances with other families, organizations, and politicians across the country who are working for change. She is a featured speaker and panelist on media and public and private events.

Her message: Black lives matter, Black minds matter, her son Miles matters, and change is possible and inevitable.



Jeffrey Hebert Communications Coordinator San Diego County Sheriff's Department

Jeff is an experienced public safety professional with extensive background in 9-1-1 and public safety dispatch operations.

Jeff has worked for the San Diego County Sheriff's Department for over 28 years. He began his career as an Emergency Services Dispatcher with the Sheriff's Department. As a dispatcher, he answered countless 9–1–1 calls, collecting vital information from callers reporting emergencies, and coordinated the response of first responders to law enforcement, fire, and emergency medical calls for service. As Jeff continued to progress in his career, he promoted to dispatch supervisor overseeing dayto-day shift operations.

In 2007, Jeff was appointed to the position of Communications Coordinator, becoming responsible for managing the systems, personnel, and overall operations of the Communications Center for the San Diego County Sheriff's Department. He is a 9-1-1 County Coordinator for the County of San Diego and is involved in several groups and committees working to improve public safety and the emergency services provided to members of the community in San Diego County.

From 2005 to 2018, Jeff was president of the San Diego Association of Public Safety Dispatchers, a non-profit organization. The association developed and delivered training courses to public safety dispatch personnel that were certified by the California Commission on Peace Officers Standards and Training (POST).

A skilled presenter and instructor, he regularly teaches courses to public safety personnel on a variety of topics. Jeff teaches learning domains in the California POST Public Safety Dispatchers' Basic Course such as Professional Orientation, Criminal Justice System, Introduction to Law, and Critical Incidents. He also teaches several continuing education courses on topics such as interoperable radio communications, digital privacy, and cybersecurity.

Miguel lost his youngest son, Alex, to suicide just over seven years ago and shortly after found Didi Hirsch. He took advantage of the different programs that Didi Hirsch

has to support families with the loss of a loved one by suicide.

Shortly after using Didi Hirsch's services, he felt the need to give back. He didn't want the loss of his son to be just a statistic, so he started volunteering. For the past six years, he has had the opportunity to facilitate eight-week groups and monthly drop-ins in English and Spanish, helping loss survivors in their grief journey. Additionally, he has written articles for Didi Hirsch's newsletter, has been interviewed and served on different suicide prevention panels. His goal is suicide-prevention.

Miguel is also the Chief Development Officer to Bezyl.com, a digital mental health app with a mission to "help people help people."

Miguel is also a member of California's Behavioral Health Task Force, and the Los Angeles Suicide Prevention Network.

She later co-authored the Didi Hirsch manual and training to bring this support group to individuals nationally and around the world. The focus of the curriculum is based on seeing strength and resiliency in participants and helping them to discover that within themselves. Shari also served on the National Action Alliance Suicide Attempt Survivors task force, helping to write seminal document, The Way Forward.

Shari has trained thousands of individuals in crisis intervention, suicide prevention and contact center management. She has provided subject matter expertise and mental health support on programming on national publications, major television networks and Broadway productions. She holds a BS in Psychology and Master's and Educational Specialist degrees in Mental Health Counseling from Florida State University.



Robert Smith Chairman Pala Band of Mission Indians

Robert H. Smith serves as Chairman of the Pala Band of Mission Indians, a position he has held

since 1990. For more than three decades, Robert Smith has dedicated himself to improving the way of life for the members of the Pala Band of Mission Indians.

As Tribal Chair, he played an integral role in the complex negotiations that resulted in Governor Wilson's signing of the Pala-State Compact in 1996, a groundbreaking agreement that legalized gaming on Indian lands in California. In 1999, Chairman Smith played an instrumental role in securing Tribal agreement on the Model Compacts, which help to ensure the continued economic freedom and independence of Tribes throughout the state. In 2004, Chairman Smith was one of five Tribal leaders to work side-by-side with Governor Schwarzenegger to come to an agreement on a set of compacts that benefited both the Tribes and the state of California.

Chairman Smith takes great pride in being actively involved in the community and lends his time and energy to a variety of organizations. He serves as a member of California Tribal Business Alliance, San Luis Rey Indian Water Authority, Southern California Tribal Chairmen's Association, San Diego Association of Governments, Indian Health Council for North San Diego County, National Fire Protection Agency, Pala Housing Authority, Vivian Banks Charter School Parent Advisory Board, Cupa Cultural Center, California Indian Manpower Consortium, California Fee-to-Trust Consortium, and the Inter-Tribal Long Term Recovery Foundation. Chairman Smith also serves as a delegate to the Tribal-Interior Budge Counsil for the Pacific Region, CalFire Advisory Board, National Congress of American Indians, and the National Temporary Assistance for Needy Families Board.

Chairman Smith has been a leader and essential contributor in the progression of Pala, including being an adocate for proactively addressing

mental health concerns, supporting suicide interventions, and understanding the role and availability of 988 for the Tribal community. He also understands the need for Tribal people to have access to culturally competent 988 crisis support. Chairman Smith fully supports the Tuchily Mobile Crisis Response Team, which is centered at the Pala Reservation, and is in collaboration with the Indian Health Clinic.
