# Medi-Cal's Crucial Role in Home and Community Based Services

- 2.3 million older adults and people with disabilities are enrolled in Medi-Cal.
- 1.5 million+ dually-eligible individuals rely on Medi-Cal to pay Medicare premiums and/or out-of-pocket costs
  - Duals are very low-income individuals with high needs
  - The Medicare Savings Programs make Medicare affordable
- Medi-Cal is often older adults' only option for long-term care
  - Two-thirds of California's nursing facility residents are on Medi-Cal
  - HCBS, often provided through waivers, help older adults to age in place

### Looking Ahead: Subcommittee Priorities:

- Share of Cost
- Reducing Administrative Barriers

#### **How is Share of Cost calculated?**

- 1. All gross income (GI)
- 2. Minus appropriate disregards
  - a) Earned income ((GEI-\$65)/2) +
  - b) Unearned income (GUI-\$20) = Countable income
- 3. Deduct all medical premiums =
- 4. Net Countable Income

### How is Share of Cost calculated? (Cont'd)

- 5. Evaluate Net Countable Income
  - a) Below \$1,801 (individual)/\$2,433 (couple) = FREE A&D FPL Medi-Cal
  - b) Above \$1,801/\$2,433 = Medically Needy SOC Medi-Cal
- 6. Net Countable Income MINUS \$600/\$934 = SHARE OF COST

## Reducing Administrative Barriers

- Projected Costs: For people with a Share of Cost. deduct "reasonably constant and predictable" medical expenses so individuals can meet their share of cost on the first of the month. Medi-Cal pays its share right away instead of waiting for individuals to incur costs.
- Presumptive Eligibility: Medi-Cal applicants who need HCBS can receive Medi-Cal services while application is finalized.
- Prompt Coverage: Implement provisional plans of care giving access to a basic set of services while HCBS applications and plans of care are approved.

Initiative	2025-26 MPA Housing Initiatives
1	Protect housing supply, housing assistance, and housing supports through coordination at all levels of government.
2	Protect promising practices and encourage replication of innovative public-private housing solutions, including rental subsidies and shared housing models, in partnership with local leaders and subject matter experts.
3	Report annually on the most recent publicly available data to track housing-related efforts and outcomes serving older adults and people with disabilities.

Initiative	2025-26 MPA Housing Initiatives
4	Launch the California behavioral health community-based organized networks of equitable care and treatment (BH-Connect) demonstration Medi-Cal transitional rent program and report annually on the number of older adults and people with disabilities served.
5	Continue to create and preserve housing options for people applying for or receiving Supplemental Security Income (SSI) or the Cash Assistance Program for Immigrants (CAPI) through the Community Care Expansion program (CCE).
6	Continue to help older adults and people with disabilities obtain housing stability through the home safe program and the Housing and Disability Advocacy Program (HDAP).

Initiative	2025-26 MPA Housing Initiatives
7	Identify affordable housing opportunities for veterans made possible through proposition 1 (2024), inclusive of older adults and people with disabilities with behavioral health challenges.
8	Present analysis of California's affordable housing supply for older adults and people with disabilities through the Home and Community Based Services (HCBS) gap analysis.
9	Analyze spending from California's housing finance programs to determine the impact and benefits to older adults and people with disabilities.

Initiative	2025-26 MPA Housing Initiatives
10	Develop tools and training to educate housing Continuums of Care (COC), aging and disability networks including Area Agencies on Aging (AAA) and Independent Living Centers (ILC), health plans, hospitals, county welfare departments, and community-based organizations on how to coordinate benefits and support services for older adults and people with disabilities who are at risk of or experiencing homelessness.

Initiative	2025-26 MPA Housing Initiatives
11	Expand emergency shelter/emergency housing assistance and provide supportive services for victims/survivors of crime with specialized needs, including older adults, people with disabilities, LGBTQIA+, non-English speaking or culturally or religiously marginalized populations through the specialized emergency housing (Key Elements [KE]) program.
12	Implement the Veterans Support to Self-Reliance (VSSR) pilot program to identify and evaluate models that help aging, highly vulnerable veterans with homelessness experience, who are residing in Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH), with on-site enhanced supportive services to keep them stably housed.

### SB 1121 CTC Transportation Needs Assessment

Elevate the California Transportation Commission (CTC) Needs Assessment to expand and improve accessible transportation.

- Ensure there is a section in the SB1121 Needs Assessment DRAFT Report mentioning accessible transportation (DONE)
- Encourage cost assessment for accessible transportation prior to next report in 2030 via CTC and State Transit Transformation Task Force

#### SB 125 Transit Transformation Task Force

Include recommendations in the final Transit Transformation Task Force report to improve the provision and governance of accessible transportation services.

- Ensure Transit Transformation Task Force agenda item covering accessible transportation (DONE)
- Propose recommendations including funding needs, removing fixed route limitation, recommendations for rural areas, enforcement of SB1376, Wheelchair Accessibility for TNCs, streamline benefits qualification, ensure mobility manager per county; more based on further discussion
- Bring recommendations to Interagency Equity Advisory Committee
- Encourage spoken and written public comment

## Improve Transportation Navigation through Cal-ITP

- Improve transportation navigation for older adults and people with disabilities by streamlining the eligibility process for benefits, standardizing definitions, and facilitating easier access to discounts through the California Integrated Travel Project (Cal-ITP).
- Include as recommendation through SB125 State Transit Transformation Task Force.
- Create recommendations for local/regional agencies
