IMMEDIATE PRIORITIES

Action Step: Housing Subcommittee recommends to the stakeholders advocates on the full DACLAC Committee to advise State and Legislature to not make reductions or impose delays in implementation in the following housing programs or housing supports and services:

Proposed cuts to Home Safe and Housing & Disability Advocacy Program (HDAP)

Proposed cuts to HHAP (Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention grant program under, Behavioral Health Bridge Housing, Behavioral Health Continuum Infrastructure Program

IMMEDIATE PRIORITIES (continued)

Proposed cuts in IHSS (In-Home Supportive Services) impacting people who are undocumented

Proposed delay (from July 1, 2024 to July 1, 2025) of full implementation of the regional center provider rate reform increases that includes supports in the home (such as supported living services)

IMMEDIATE PRIORITIES (continued)

That the State identify and consider the impact of ALL proposed reductions and delays that impact the whole person rather than just looking at how it impacts that service or support within a specific department budget - and also looking at the impact over a two year budget period.

That the full committee recommend to the CalHHS Master Plan for Developmental Services Stakeholder Committee the need to make a priority housing, housing related supports and services, homelessness prevention (including workers who provide supports and services) and is linked to housing and housing supports related initiatives in the Master Plan for Aging

IMMEDIATE PRIORITIES (continued)

That the State identify and consider the impact of ALL proposed _____ reductions and delays that impact the whole person rather than just looking at how it impacts that service or support within a specific department budget - and also looking at the impact over a two year budget period.

That the full committee recommend to the CalHHS Master Plan for Developmental Services Stakeholder Committee the need to make a priority housing, housing related supports and services, homelessness prevention (including workers who provide supports and services) and is linked to housing and housing supports related initiatives in the Master Plan for Aging

Short-term priorities

- Action steps to help break down silos and develop inventory of state and local government services related housing, housing supports, homelessness prevention, renter protections, etc. and provide input to the efforts to develop a "No Wrong Door" that include housing and homelessness prevention
- Action steps to improve access and transparency to CalAIM (California Advancing and Innovating Medi-Cal) housing-related community supports including housing navigation, rental assistance/security deposits, tenancy sustaining services, housing modifications. Make these services statewide

Short-term priorities (continued)

- Action steps for State to review housing assessment tools including coordinated entry system used to assess housing needs and homelessness prevention

Short-term priorities - (continued)

- Recommend that the State pursue federal funding for a pilot shallow subsidy program targeting rental assistance for older adults and people with disabilities at imminent risk of homelessness (Master Plan for Aging Initiative #2)
- Recommend adoption of Low Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) rent cap protections applied to *current* LIHTC properties (the California Tax Credit Allocation Committee state regulations now have rent caps for *future* construction)

Short-term priorities - CONTINUED

- Recommend adoption of rent protections for mobile homeowners who rent the land from park owners not protected by local ordinances.

Short-term priorities - CONTINUED

- Recommend clarification of rental cap protections on RCFE (Residential Care Facilities for the Elderly) and ARF (Adult Residential Facilities) and strengthening of protections from additional service costs

- Recommend that remaining Community Care
Expansion funds be directed to funding
Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) and other
publicly subsidized housing in the community

LONGER-TERM PRIORITIES

Renter Protections and Rent Stabilization - seek statewide funding for targeted rental assistance for acutely low-income older adults and adults with disabilities at imminent risk of homelessness (Initiative #2 of the Master Plan for Aging)

Policy Background

Assess Funding Needs

Two current initiatives are authorized by state law to assess and make recommendations regarding transportation funding. These initiatives should assess and recommend funding to implement recommendations from multiple previous state studies.

- SB 1121 (2022) requires California Transportation Commission in consultation with CalSTA and Caltrans to prepare a needs assessment of the cost to operate, maintain, and provide for the necessary future growth of the state and local transportation system for the next 10 years. The Needs Assessment is due on or before Jan 1, 2025 and every 5 years thereafter.
- SB 125 (2023) requires CalSTA to convene a Transit Transformation Task Force to develop policy recommendations relating to transit funding, improving the transit experience for all users, and growing transit ridership. CalSTA, in consultation with the task force, is required to submit a report of findings and policy recommendations based to the Legislature on or before October 31, 2025.

Guide existing funding

Better Utilize Coordinated Plan Funding Guidance for Federal Funding

Federal law requires locally developed Coordinated Plans to guide Section 5310 federal funding intended for transit dependent and transit disadvantaged people - including the elderly, disabled, and persons of limited means. Caltrans reaffirms this in its State Management Plan. California case study shows an insufficient alignment between the priorities identified in the Coordinated Plans and the State Management Plan and the uses of Section 5310 funding. **This alignment should be improved.**

Reform "Unmet Needs" Process for State Funding

California's Transportation Development Act (TDA) requires jurisdictions to identify unmet transit needs and those needs that are reasonable to meet in order to guide state TDA funding.

The determination of unmet needs should consider the needs identified in Coordinated Plans so that TDA funds can be used for Coordinated Plan implementation, and should include a public review process to provide transparency.

Overview: California Integrated Travel Project

California Integrated Travel Project (Cal-ITP) is a statewide program working to make transit travel payment simple and more cost effective.

- Cal-ITP enables open payments (pay with credit / debit card)
- Cal-ITP Benefits is a free web application available to transit providers to help automate eligibility verification and enrollment for people receiving reduced fares, making it significantly easier for older adults and people with disabilities to receive and use discounted transit.
- Cal-ITP is also working to standardize eligibility requirements across the state as different jurisdictions have varying qualification policies for discounted fare programs that make it confusing and time consuming for users.

Policy Recommendations: California Integrated Travel Project

Statewide

- Caltrans to set standard statewide definitions of those eligible for benefits.
- Create a single statewide digital "source of truth" to determine eligibility
- Require transit operators that receive TDA state funding to honor eligibility from a centralized service alongside their existing processes
- Create a standard definition of caregiver to streamline provision of benefits to caregivers
- Continue to allow cash payment until/unless there are ubiquitous and convenient options for the unbanked and underbanked

Regional/subregional

- Recommend transit agency support Open Payment and eligibility verification
- Regional network management authorities require agencies to honor eligibility from centralized source

Timeline: California Integrated Travel Project

- September 2022: Senior discounts for Monterey Salinas Transit
- November 2023: Veteran discounts for Monterey Salinas Transit
- October 2024: Medicare cardholder enrollment pathway
- December 2024: Disabled person enrollment pathway
