Sheri Burns, *Silicon Valley Independent Living Center*

Sheri Burns is a San Jose native and has worked in independent living/disability services for over thirty-eight years, with twenty-five years of experience as an executive or deputy executive director in Independent Living. Ms. Burns holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Occupational Therapy, is a Registered Occupational Therapist, and obtained a certificate in non-profit management from the United Way, Silicon Valley. She also has extensive training in disability rights and laws, ADA access standards, and disaster services focusing on Access and Functional Needs.

Hagar Dickman, *Justice in Aging*

Hagar is a Senior Attorney at Justice in Aging, where she works to achieve equity in California's Home and Community Based Services for low-income older adults. In that role, Hagar identifies barriers and solutions to increasing access to California's community support programs, and provides education, training and support to stakeholders and advocates statewide. Prior to Justice in Aging, Hagar started the Veterans Legal Project at Bay Area Legal Aid where she provided veterans wrap-around legal services in the areas of disability rights, health, economic and housing security. Hagar also ran a medical legal partnership with the Palo Alto Veterans Health Administration, and a reentry legal clinic for justice-involved veterans at Santa Clara's Veterans Mental Health Court. Hagar began her career at Law Foundation's Mental Health Advocacy Project, where she represented individuals with mental health disabilities in housing, benefits, health access and consumer issues. She earned her J.D. in 2010 from Loyola University Chicago School of Law, including a year studying international human rights law at the University of Copenhagen, and received her undergraduate degree in Anthropology from Brandeis University.

Susan DeMarois joined the California Department of Aging (CDA) as Director on November 1, 2021. Peter served as both Vice Chair and Chair of the Council during his tenure. Since leaving the Council, Peter served on the Tarjan Center Community Advisory Committee, the California State Rehabilitation Appeals Board, the City of Berkeley Commission on Disability, and on the Board of Directors for Easy Does It Emergency Services in Berkeley. Peter is still very active, currently serving as Chair of the Golden Gate Regional Center Self Determination Community Advisory Committee, Consumer Advocate for the California Olmstead Advisory Committee, member of the California State Independent Living Council as appointed by Governor Edmund G. Brown Jr., in addition to working at Marin Center for Independent Living as their Director of Advocacy and Special Projects. Peter lives in Elk Grove with his wife, Jennifer, and their dog, Latte. His phone rings frequently with calls from people with disabilities and their families requesting his advocacy expertise and policy advice.

Kim Mills, *A Better Life Together, Inc.*

Kimberly Mills has over 30 years of experience providing social services to youth, adults, and their families. Kim is the founder and CEO of A Better Life Together, Inc.(ABLT) that supports individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities who live and work in the community. ABLT provides supported and independent living services and day services to adults in San Diego County. Kim is the proud mother of 3 amazing sons Antoine, Naeem, and Jaleni. Naeem passed away unexpectedly in 2016 at the age of 22 due to a seizure. Naeem's death reignited Kim's passion to continue advocating for the rights of communities of color who are underserved within the IDD community. Kim is originally from Ohio and holds a Master's degree in Community Counseling from Kent State University. Kim is a board member of the California Community Living Network and serves on the Disability Services Task Force.

Marty Omoto, *California Disability Community Action Network*

Marty Omoto is a parent of a 31-year-old son with Down syndrome and autism spectrum disorders and family member of older sister with developmental and physical disabilities and behavioral/mental health needs. Marty's life as an advocate for disability rights, for social and economic justice and equity, for Asian/Pacific Islander awareness and rights, and for older persons had a foundation as a Japanese-American, whose parents, grandparents and other family along with 120,000 other Japanese-Americans, were imprisoned during World War II in internment camps in one of the greatest single act of racial discrimination of an entire population. Marty founded, California Disability-Aging Community Action Network (CDCAN) in 2000, as a vehicle to connect people to credible non-partisan information and public policy and advocacy across the state. Marty serves currently as member of the Department of Developmental Services (DDS) Developmental Services Task Force; the California Health and Human Services (CalHHS) Disability and Aging Community Living Advisory Committee (formerly Olmstead Advisory Committee); CalHHS Elder and Disability Justice Coordinating Council; the Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) Medi-Cal Managed Care Advisory Group; and numerous other stakeholder workgroups and committees including those with the California Department of Social Services (CDSS), California Department of Aging (CDA) and Department of Rehabilitation (DOR). He previously served as board member and late president of the board of the Sacramento Paratransit Inc; board member for 10 years on Resources for Independent Living (RIL) a Sacramento independent living center; State Bar of California Civil Justice Strategies Commission; CalHHS Future of the Developmental Centers Task Force; CDSS Community First Choice Option stakeholder advisory group, and on several legislative task forces and

workgroups covering issues from disability public access, special education, funding for developmental services, IHSS, and aging.

Andrea is a very knowledgeable and intelligent person who suffers from mild cognitive impairment (MCI) as a result of a traumatic brain injury. She has years of experience working as a case manager in human services and mental health, as well as advocating for others to receive resources and services. Andrea previously worked as a Certified Nurse Assistant/Medication Aide in the healthcare field. During her 20 years in healthcare, she worked in a variety of settings, including hospitals, home health, hospice care, and assisted living facilities. As a Certified Nursing Assistant, she worked with people with various forms of dementia and Alzheimer's disease. Andrea previously served on the California Health and Human Services (CalHHS) Agency's Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders Advisory Committee. Andrea represents the voices of underserved and underrepresented people living in their homes and communities who require supportive services to live a quality life with this disease. These people experience daily limitations and impairments as a result of MCI, or dementia. Andrea is passionate about advocating for more direct services and resources for people living with dementia and Alzheimer's, as well as raising awareness that existing services do not always reach those in greatest need. She co-founded an Alzheimer's Association-hosted support group for people living with various types of cognitive impairment. Younger onset refers to individuals under the age of 62. The group was formed in 2021 with members from various states and is still going strong.

When IHSS initiated the Public Authorities and the Advisory Committees, she became involved in its development in Santa Clara County, drawing on her many years of experience educating persons with disabilities about how to hire, manage, and if necessary, fire providers. As the current President of the California In-Home Supportive Services Consumer Alliance, she advocates on issues affecting both seniors and persons with disabilities both at the local, State, and Federal levels.
