Sheri Burns, Silicon Valley Independent Living Center

Sheri Burns is a San Jose native and has worked in independent living/disability services for over forty years, with twenty-six years of experience as an executive or deputy executive director in Independent Living. As an unpaid, young adult family caregiver, she has lived experience navigating Medi-Cal (and its lapses), IHSS (throughout a period of housing insecurity), 1915c waivers, and cancer treatment within geographically managed care programs for a dual-eligible recipient. She is driven to expanding equitable access to HCBS, improved resources for the overlooked middle, which is not so middle anymore, and continued recognition, skills-training, and substantive material support for the family caregivers who thanklessly uphold California's Californians. In a parallel life, Joanna is a writer & filmmaker dedicated to reflecting the reality that older adults, people with disabilities, and those who care for them are in every other anonymous living room. She believes that "their" stories are everyone's stories, whether or not folks know it yet. In addition to tenure with DACLAC, she is a proud member of the California Coalition on Family Caregiving and volunteer with local LGBTQIA+-serving organizations in Northern California, which know that "family" is an expansive word. While her grandmother would've preferred she become a doctor, Joanna is proud and grateful to be here for those who might not have the privilege of wi-fi, of English language (policy) fluency, of time (spare or otherwise) to advocate for those who, too, believe their grandparent, sibling, child, friend, mentor, neighbor, or stranger in this beloved State deserve to live and age in their own home, in their own community. She knows her grandmother, who cared at home for her own immigrant mother until her passing, agreed. This is for you, little one, and everyone else we've never met.

Barbara Hanna, California Association for Health Services at Home

In 1979, Dr. Barbara Hanna started to provide temporary nursing staff for hospitals in Northern California. A short time later, she began to receive calls from community members asking her for assistance in caring for their loved ones at home. Understanding that people preferred to be at home while recuperating rather than in the hospital, she founded Home Health Care Management, Inc. Dr. Hanna graduated from California State University, Chico with a bachelor's degree in nursing in 1975. Dr.

Hanna received a Doctor of Philosophy in Nursing Science and Health-Care Leadership from the University of California, Davis in 2015. She has worked in a variety of health care settings, including acute care hospitals, adult day health care centers, dialysis clinics and home health. She has also taught nursing and allied health at Butte Community College, and Administration of Long-term care at California State University, Chico.
