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

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

Data for Equity and Making Recommendations

- Collecting and reporting data about people can help identify specific barriers different people have when they are trying to access and receive services.
- Data can be used to identify differences in the type and number of services people receive by race, age, language, and region.
- Workgroups can request data reports from DDS and other departments to inform discussions and recommendations.





Types

- Qualitative data is information that is not represented by numbers. Qualitative information is often collected using surveys, focus groups and interviews.
- Quantitative data uses
 numbers to describe something
 that can be counted, measured,
 or given a value.

Time Periods

- Static data does not change with time and is often called point-in-time data.
- **Dynamic data** changes with time as new information becomes available.
- Longitudinal data includes data about a group of individuals, families, organizations or other entities that is collected over a period of time.

Levels

- Micro-data is about an individual or single event and could include the number of service coordinators in a specific regional center that speak Spanish.
- Macro-data is grouped to create a big-picture view or level and could include data about all Spanish language speaking service coordinators in the state.

Data for Equity and Making Recommendations

Types of data to help assess and understand equity

- Age
- Race
- Ethnicity
- Preferred language/communication style
- Gender identity
- Sexual orientation
- Geographic location



Request data to answer questions and inform discussions

- How big is the problem?
- What is being done to solve the problem?
- Is there evidence that this problem is getting better or worse?
- What barriers stand in the way to solving the problem?

Considerations when requesting and analyzing data

- Quality
- Availability
- Timeframe
- Privacy

Workgroup 1 Priorities (discussion draft)



- 1. Build trust in Regional Center systems and other systems, particularly for people of color.
- 2. Ensure that every individual who meets service eligibility chooses and receives individualized services, including those not currently in the system regardless of race, ethnicity, or location.
- 3. Ensure individuals have choice and control over their lives by making self-determination the core of the DD system.
- 4. Ensure equity of access and options in Regional Center services while still assuring a person-centered system to support consistency in the experience of families and individuals.

Workgroup 2 Priorities (discussion draft)



- 1. Remove barriers and silos across all service systems by Increasing access to services provided by agencies outside of the developmental disabilities system.
- Improve consistency of life-span transitions with planning and continuity of services such as early start, transition-aged youth, and aging Measure individual outcomes, system outcomes and performance
- 3. Access to services which meet individuals' basic needs including but not limited to:
 - Behavioral health and mental health
 - Health care
 - Crisis prevention

Workgroup 3 Priorities (discussion draft)



- 1. Expand pipeline and career pathways to attract employees and ensure diversity that is representative of the community.
- 2. Ensure adequate compensation and supports in order to recruit and keep quality staff from diverse communities, particularly those with lived experience.
- 3. Ensure clarity and consistency in the roles and responsibilities of service coordinators across the systems to ensure they provide culturally responsive services that meet the needs of service recipients.

Workgroup 4 Priorities (discussion draft)



Priorities

1. Ensure the system has a consistent interpretation of regional centers' responsibilities (i.e., establish a common set of statewide regional center standards, services, and rates).

- 2. Enhance data and technology system to make information available to everyone:
 - Provide individual and family access to their information
 - Measure individual outcomes, system outcomes and performance

3. Strengthen regional center accountability for achieving outcomes identified by the individual.







- I. Maximizing federal reimbursement by increasing Medicaid enrollment for individuals and making eligibility processes easy on individuals and families (in response to fear and concerns around current terminology [e.g., "institutionalization"]).
- 2. Integrate waiver and State Plan services across systems to improve quality of life and outcomes.
- 3. Innovate and expand service types that support community living and can be covered by Medicaid or other systems, such as housing or transportation, to promote inclusive systems and communities.
