Lydia Missaelides, Executive Director of the Alliance for Leadership and Education

Lydia has enjoyed a 35 year career in public policy and program development in aging, mental health, and disabilities. Lydia earned her Master's degree in Health Administration from the University of Southern California.

After serving 30 years as Executive Director for the California Association for Adult Day Services, concurrently with serving as the Executive Director of the Alliance for Leadership and Education since 2003, Lydia retired from CAADS to devote her time to ALE, the public benefit and research arm of CAADS.

Lydia was appointed in November 2019 to serve as a member of Governor Newsom's Long Term Services and Supports Subcommittee for a Master Plan for Aging and an appointed charter member of the California Health and Human Service Agency's Olmstead Advisory Committee. The model TRIP Program for Riverside County California, funded with grants, has provided 2,.4 million one-way trips and 32.7 million miles of volunteer assisted transportation for elderly, disabled, sick, isolated and low-income residents, without alternative means of transportation, at an average cost of one-way trip of \$6.10. Before my accident I was very involved in my children's school organizations. Forty years ago, I started an Art History and Art Appreciation Program in the local school district that exists to this day and is a model Statewide. When the Public Authorities and the Advisory Committees for IHSS began I was involved in its development in Santa Clara County. Having dealt with PCA's for many years and educating many Persons with disabilities how to hire, manage, and if necessary, fire providers, I knew how important this program was.

Once the Advisory Committees were mandated, I started, with the help of CAPA, CICA; CA IHSS Consumer Alliance. Early on we realized that AC's would need education and training to fully fulfill their mandates. CICA still exists and I am the current President. I am very much involved in the advocacy of issues affecting both Seniors and Persons with Disabilities both at the local, State, and Federal level. Being involved with other State Organizations has broadened my perspectives and opportunities.

When not busy with my volunteer work, I am involved with my very supportive Family: my husband, three married children and seven grandchildren. Life is good.

Kate Wilber, USC Center for Long-Term Care Integration
