- » The Final Home and Community-Based Settings Final Rule was published by CMS in 2014 and is referred to as the "Final Rule."
- » The regulation covers all 1915(c) and 1915(i) state plan programs – Also includes any 1915(k) programs approved after March 2014, 1115 Demonstrations, and 1915(b)(3) waiver services.

- » Makes certain that individuals receiving services through HCBS programs have full access to the benefits of community living.
- » Further expands the opportunities for meaningful community integration in support of the goals of the ADA and the Supreme Court decision in Olmstead.
- » To enhance the quality of HCBS and provide protections to individuals receiving services.

#### » The Final Rule addresses the following:

- »Cultural considerations
- » Visitors
- »Access to food
- »Landlord/tenant protections
- »Freedom of movement
- »Privacy, dignity, and respect
- »Freedom from coercion

#### » The Final Rule addresses the following:

- »Who provides services and supports
- »What services and supports are chosen by the individual
- »Where individuals live
- »Who individuals live with

#### » The Final Rule addresses the following:

- »What individuals do with their time and resources
- »Individuals directing their own person-centered plan
- »Being involved in community activities and groups
- »Ability to exercise rights, make choices and to vote

# **Characteristics of HCBS Settings**

- » 1.Integration and access to the broader community
- » 2. Selected by the individual among settings options
- » 3.Ensures individual rights of privacy, dignity, and respect, and freedom from coercion and restraint
- » 4. Optimizes autonomy and independence in making life choices
- » 5. Facilitates choice regarding services and who provides them

# **Setting Assessment**

- » CMS requires states to conduct validated site-specific assessments of provider-owned or controlled settings, to ensure each setting meets all requirements of the Final Rule by March 17, 2023.
- » If the assessment determines that an HCBS setting does not comply with the Final Rule, the State will provide information to the provider about remediation steps that must be taken to comply.

#### Remediation

- » HCBS Settings received their completed site assessments report with Remediation report, called Remediation Work Plans.
- » Providers developed workplans with evidence to submit to the State.
- » The State will monitor timelines and completion of plans until compliant.

# **Heightened Scrutiny**

- The heightened scrutiny process allows California to demonstrate that settings can overcome the institutional presumption by submitting evidentiary packages for CMS review.
- » Settings may be determined to be Heightened Scrutiny for one of three reasons, or "prongs."

# **Heightened Scrutiny**

- Prong 1: The setting is located in a building that is also a publicly or privately operated facility, which provides inpatient institutional treatment.
- » Prong 2: The setting is located in a building located on the grounds of, or immediately adjacent to, a public institution.
- » Prong 3: The setting has the effect of isolating individuals.

# California's Corrective Action Plan (CAP)

- » DHCS submitted a request for a Corrective Action Plan (CAP) to ask for an extension through June 30, 2024, to fully demonstrate compliance with the Final Rule.
- » The State is investing in the recruitment, training, and retention initiatives including initiatives funded through its approved HCBS Spending Plan.

# **Department Roles**

- » States must submit a Statewide Transition Plan (STP) for existing 1915(c) and 1915(i) programs.
- » The STP describes the state's process for ensuring compliance with home and community-based setting requirements
- » As the single state agency for Medicaid/Medi-Cal, DHCS administers or oversees the HCBS programs in collaboration with sister departments which are the focus of the STP.
- » States must be in compliance with the HCBS by March 17, 2023.

#### Where we are now - DHCS

- » DHCS is working with providers to close out evidence reviews and compliance validations.
- » DHCS continues to provide technical assistance to providers on remediation strategies.
- » CAP initiatives to reduce the workforce shortage have begun to take place.
- » HS materials are being submitted to CMS.

#### Where we are now - CDA

- » To date, no CBAS programs have been out of compliance with the federal requirements
- » The <u>CBAS Transition Plan</u> (Attachment 1 of the STP) describes the CBAS compliance determination process\*
- » Compliance must be demonstrated and remediated during a center's Certification Renewal Process every two years

#### Where we are now - DDS

- » Outreach and Training
- » Validation of compliant policies and procedures in each setting
- » Heightened Scrutiny
- » Ongoing Monitoring
- Strengthening direct service workforce and outreach to individuals served

# Advocating for Full Implementation of the Final Settings Rule

### Why the Final Settings Rule Matters to HCBS Users

- Entitled to lease or other legally enforceable agreement
- ➤ Right to privacy
- >The individual controls his/her own schedule
- >Access to food at any time
- ➤ Can have visitors at any time; and
- >The setting is physically accessible.



#### Cost of Inadequate Implementation

- Non-compliant settings can lose funding provided by federal matching
- Consumers may lose residence, have to relocate, or lose services without compliant alternatives
  OR
- Consumers continue to receive services in nonintegrated, inaccessible settings that do not live up to the spirit of the HCBS Setting Rule or Olmstead.



- » DHCS: Oversees the Medi-Cal side of project and provides key data for Gap Analysis and Multi-Year Roadmap project
- » CDA: Oversees the non-Medi-Cal side of project and provides key data for Gap Analysis and Multi-Year Roadmap project

### Intersections Between DHCS and CDA Projects

- » Quantitative analyses for both projects will use data from various HCBS programs to characterize enrollees and providers and identify gaps in services
- » Approach for both projects will use quantitative and qualitative data and stakeholder engagement to bring different perspectives into the gap analyses and roadmaps
- » Findings from both projects will be summarized with concrete plans for filling gaps across HCBS programs

### DHCS Gap Analysis and Multi-Year Roadmap Goals

- » Identify and analyze opportunities to expand access to HCBS
- » Address and close identified gaps as the state transitions to a fully-integrated MLTSS system by 2027
- » Improve health outcomes, consumer satisfaction, and health equity for Medicaid beneficiaries in California

### DHCS Gap Analysis and Multi-Year Roadmap Activities

#### » Gap Analysis

» Use a mixed methods approach to identify critical gaps in California's HCBS programs and service delivery system to meet the needs of Medi-Cal eligible older adults and individuals with disabilities

#### » Multi-Year Roadmap


- » Develop a Multi-Year Roadmap based on the results of the gap analysis and feedback from DHCS and other stakeholders. The Roadmap will provide a step-by-step plan to address LTSS needs in the state by:
  - » Identifying ways to expand HCBS providers' capacity
  - » Strengthening partnerships among the state, counties, health plans, providers, and community-based organizations
  - » Identifying key milestones and benchmarks to help DHCS monitor progress

### Gap Analysis and Multi-Year Roadmap Populations of Focus

Medi-Cal members who may be:

- » Receiving HCBS waiver program services
- » Receiving Long-Term Care or Skilled Nursing Facility care
- » At risk of requiring LTSS, including beneficiaries receiving LTSS or HCBS, through programs funded under the Older Americans Act (OAA) and administered locally by Area Agencies on Aging, Aging and Disability Resource Connections (ADRCs), Independent Living Center (ILCs), or Caregiver Resource Centers (CRCs)
- » Served by CA's waiver and state plan programs for developmental disabilities and/or HIV/AIDS
- » Certain Medi-Cal Managed Care members



### Interrelated DHCS LTSS Initiatives: California LTSS Dashboard

- » DHCS' goal is to create a public-facing LTSS dashboard to track demographic, utilization, quality, and cost data related to LTSS. This dashboard links statewide long-term care and HCBS data with the goal of increased transparency to make it possible for regulators, policymakers, and the public to be informed while the state continues to expand, enhance and improve the quality of LTSS in all home, community, and congregate settings
- » DHCS released the initial version of California's Long-Term Services and Supports dashboard in December 2022
- » The LTSS dashboard features data from 2017-2021 and includes 40 measures related to Medi-Cal enrollment and service utilization
- The LTSS dashboard and the DHCS and CDA Gap Analysis and Roadmap projects are complementary and part of a larger effort to improve LTSS in the state

### Interrelated DHCS LTSS Initiatives: LTSS Data Transparency

- » LTSS Data Transparency Initiative will include
  - » Demographic, utilization, access, quality, and equity measures to include as part of the state's LTSS dashboard
  - » Common set of performance metrics for the state to display on its LTSS dashboard, that can be leveraged across programs, providers, and systems of care and is aligned with the DHCS Comprehensive Quality Strategy
  - » Recommendations for measures related to demographics, utilization, equity, and access as informed by the analyses in Objectives 1 and 2

### Interrelated DHCS LTSS Initiatives: D-SNP Quality Reporting

- State-specific reporting requirements for D-SNPs are part of a larger quality strategy within DHCS, including a focus on the Comprehensive Quality Strategy focused on dual eligible individuals, the Long-Term Services and Supports (LTSS) dashboard, and the Master Plan for Aging.
- » DHCS monitors the quality of care and health equity provided to members in Medi-Cal through various reporting requirements, as detailed in the 2022 DHCS Comprehensive Quality Strategy and Medi-Cal contracts in the following domains:
  - » Access/Availability of Care
  - » Effectiveness of Care
  - » Utilization and Risk Adjusted Utilization
  - » Care Coordination
  - » Organizational Structure and Staffing
  - » MTLSS
  - » Alzheimer's/Dementia Quality of Care

### **ACCESSIBLE TRANSPORTATION RECIPE** = MODERNIZED POLICY + STABLE FUNDING

Fund, expand, and empower **Consolidated Transportation Services** Agencies (CTSA)

CTSA's are a flexible local model structured to fit local conditions rural, urban, suburban, etc.

(think Aging and Disability Resource **Connection No Wrong Door Model)** 

CTSAs advocate for, organize, and provide accessible transportation services such as:

- » Walkability
- » Rollability
- » Wayfinding
- » Affordability
- » Volunteer Driver Programs
- » Door Through Door Services
- » Same Day/Demand Response Rides
- » Cross County Trips





### Two Huge Victories!

- 1. Aging Funders select transportation policy project
  - Seamless Bay Area leading
    - Genesis engaging consumer voices to inform the work
    - Choice in Aging providing technical support
- 2. Assemblymember Buffy Wicks to carry our legislation
  - Modernizing the Social Services Transportation Improvement Act (this is where Consolidated Transportation Services Agencies were created)
  - Funding





### **Disability Transit Access Project**

The disability justice ecosystem in California is woefully under-resourced, often excludes the voices of directly impacted people, and is underrepresented in the transportation planning space. While important progress has been made in the disability justice movement, accessible transportation remains excluded and has shown little improvement in the past few decades.

### **Project Objectives:**

- Solicit input from caregivers and end users of transportation to inform the policy framework.
- Develop a policy framework for statewide efforts toward systems transformation in accessible transportation.
- Coordination efforts to lift and educate policy makers with the goal of adoption of the policy framework.
